Communion Meditation is an anthem for the Lord's Supper that may be performed throughout the year and may be especially appropriate for communion on Easter Sunday, Ascension, and the Day of Pentecost. Suggested corresponding lectionary readings include Exodus 12: 1-14, Psalm 116: 12-19, Matthew 26: 17-29, Mark 14: 12-25, Luke 22: 7-23, and 1 Corinthians 11: 23-26. One basic homiletical theme is invoking the presence of the risen Lord as we partake of the holy wine and bread, symbols of the Savior who died for our sins.

Gently flowing 4-measure phrases and an unforgettable melody are the hallmarks of this communion offering. Rehearse all voices quietly in unison on the melody, mm. 5-28, singing a neutral syllable such as "noo" until pitches are secure and vocal tone is focused. Add the text with proper inflection and a basic feeling of two pulses per measure. Guard against singing "note-for-note," that is, all pitches inflected equally. Add the voice parts without sacrificing good musicianship.
