GREENSLEEVES

"Greensleeves" is an English renaissance tune which probably originated in the 1500s. It has enjoyed popularity throughout the ages and has been set to a variety of sacred and secular texts. In the 20th century Ralph Vaughn Williams used the tune in his opera Sir John in Love, and Gustav Holst incorporated the tune into his St. Paul Suite. "Greensleeves" is also the melody for the popular Christmas song "What Child Is This?," which is often performed during the holidays in December.

Though most often performed in 6/8 time, this arrangement is written in 3/4 time. The change from compound to simple meter gives the music a slightly different character than is normally heard. The piece contains an introduction and coda, both in a rubato style with common 20th-century harmonies. The introduction features a violin solo, and the coda features a string quartet soli.

This is an excellent piece to develop dynamic contrast, legato playing and vibrato. First violins and basses shift into 3rd position. All other parts remain in 1st position.
