anterbury Walk should be approached in the grand tradition of the British wind band. The opening and closing sections should be played lightly and marchlinke, with the middle section played broadly and lyrically.

The tempo marking of J=100 is flexible and should be determined by the broadlywritten section at measures  $\boxed{49}$  –  $\boxed{110}$ . This section will bog down if played too slowly, but it will lose its "stately" manner if played too fast.

Attention to articulations and dynamics are critical. Cues are to be used when necessary and at the discretion of the director.
