Setting

The town of Hamelin ... fairy tale times.

SCENE 1: Hamelin Town Square

(Two narrators appear downstage right. One of them carries a large book with "Rats! The Story of the Pied Piper" written on the front. They sit on stools, open the book and read aloud.)

NARRATOR 1: A long time ago, a time before airplanes and cars and buses and trains ...

NARRATOR 2: ... a time before television, CD players, computers, and video games, there was a quaint

little village in a green valley next to a gently flowing river.

NARRATOR 1: Artists came from miles around to paint pictures of the valley with its river and village

because it was so beautiful.

NARRATOR 2: And the name of the village was Hamelin.

(Townspeople enter from behind the audience or from backstage and sing while moving about town, greeting each other.)

1. HAMELIN

(Townspeople and Rats)





MAYOR: Yes, but all you did was blow a few notes on your pipe. You can't expect one thousand for

that. Tell you what, we'll double our offer, and give you one hundred guilders.

PIPER: This is ridiculous! I won't argue with you. Pay me my fee, or you will regret it, Sir!

SCENE 7: The Piper's Revenge

(Piper exits downstage right. Town Council members exit mumbling downstage left. Children enter stage area from upstage right and left, singing and playing hide and seek. At measure 37, the Piper enters from upstage center, playing his pipe and weaving in and out of the children. As he passes by, each child continues singing, but stops playing and freezes in a "stop-action" position. As the last child reaches the suspended animation state, the Piper stops playing, claps his hands together with glee and runs across the stage, down through the audience, and out of the auditorium. Parents enter the stage area and see their "frozen" children. Dialog continues at measure 59.)
