Ancient Legends is a two-movement suite that musically depicts two legendary creatures from ancient times—the quiet and serene character of the unicorn and the hideous and territying Minotaur.

The unicorn is a legendary animal commonly portrayed as a white horse with a goat's beard and a large, pointed, spiraling horn projecting from its forehead. First mentioned by the ancient Greeks, it became the most important imaginary animal of the middle ages and Renaissance when it was commonly described as an extremely wild woodland creature, a symbol of purity and grace its horn was said to have the power to render poisoned water potable and to heal sickness.

In Greek mythology, the Minotaur was a creature with the head of a bull on the body of a man. He dwelt at the center of the Cretan Labyrinth, which was an elaborate maze-like construction built for King Minos of Crete and designed by the architect Daedalus and his son learns who were ordered to build it to hold the Minotaur.
