PROGRAM NOTES

This wonderful music arranged for young instrumentalists is a testament to the everlasting works of this great composer of music. Composed during the 17th to 18th centuries, Bach's music rates high in appeal and gives pleasure to present day audiences. These two small pieces are part of the extensive output of this talented musician, organist, and composer.

NOTES TO THE CONDUCTOR

The two short pieces that form this suite are not taken from one larger work. The "Chorale" was taken from a collection of 198 four-part chorales written by Bach most likely for his church musical services, while the "Fugue" is part of the Goldberg Variations a musical composition of an Aria and 30 variations that was commissioned by a chamber musician. The two distinctive styles compliment the presentation and display the magnitude of his musical talent.

Dynamic markings have been carefully marked but may be adjusted to balance your ensemble.

Describe the differences of style in these two pieces to your ensemble—the flowing style of the "Chorale" with its full ensemble sound vs. the interplay of themes in the "Fugue" in its contrapuntal form.

The timpanipart may be omitted if your ensemble does not have three timpani drums.
