PROGRAM NOTES

Drew Pearson and Greg Holden originally wrote "Home" which became a debut single and coronation song from *American Idol* season 11 winner Phillips Phillips Phillips released his recording of "Home" as a single on May 23, 2012, and it debuted at number 10 on the Billboard Hot 100 with a first week sales figure of 278,000 downloads. It is the biggest digital sales week for any *Idol* winner's coronation song. The song was later used in the NBC coverage of the 2012 Summer Olympics giving Phillips worldwide notoriety. The song "Home" has just gone platinum and become a runaway success for Phillips.

NOTES TO THE CONDUCTOR

This arrangement is very easy to rehearse and perform. If it is played early during the school year, notice that in the introduction and then later at rehearsal number 43 and 51, the original melody line has a dotted quarter note followed by an eighth note. This concept is usually introduced at the end of Book I in most band methods. However, given that this pop tune has received much exposure and the fact that most students may play the melody by ear, the original routh mass been written.

Students should play the dotted quarter note long while tapping the foot twice on the beat and then moving along. This usually does the trick. Also, this arrangement provides an opportunity to introduce the mallet percussion player(s) with the simple use of two mallets. Keep in mind that depending on the number of percussionists, the percussion 1 part may be played by one player on drumset and it will sound just as good.

Ultimately, as is the case with most beginning band publications, all parts have been doubled.
