NOTES TO THE CONDUCTOR

The overall feel of this arrangement is very much in the Count Basie tradition and should be played with a very smooth, relaxed swing feel. In this vein, special care should be taken to get a full and blended ensemble sound, even when the dynamic is mf. And in general, dynamics must be carefully followed to make sure the intended contrast is clear

For the wind players, the articulation and phrasing have been carefully marked. The ends of phrases should be held for their full value. Special attention should be paid to the *marcato* or rooftop accent. This articulation should not be played too short—think "daht." Except in places marked otherwise, all phrases should be played *legato*.

This arrangement incorporates Bill Evans's version of modulating from F to Ab for the second half of the tune.

A suggested solo is provided for the trumpet solo that begins in m. 43, but the more experienced player is encouraged to improvise his or her own solo. A suggested alto sax solo is provided in m. 61, and again, the more experienced player is encouraged to improvise his or her own solo.

The piano player should use the piano part as a guide. Specific parts behind the ensemble are written out. Behind the trumpet and alto solo, suggested voicings and rhythms are provided, but the more advanced player is encouraged to use original voicings and rhythms. The bass part is fully notated, but the more experienced player is encouraged to create his or her own lines. Chord symbols are provided on the part.

The drum part shows the ensemble figures as a guide. The ride-cymbal pattern should be steady and swinging. Finally, the climax of this piece starts with the pickups to m. 77 (where the brass trade fours with the reeds), and it should be the dynamic peak.
