Carol of the Kings – Partner songs are usually easy to learn and a fun way to introduce harmony to beginning choirs, but they also provide a "sure thing" for more advanced groups, and can be perfected in minimal rehearsal time. While this is not strictly a partner song in the traditional sense, many of the sections work as such, comprised of two melodies – one original and one familiar – that create harmony when sung together. While the familiar melody from "We Three Kings of Orient Are" will not immediately stand out, be certain that the voice part carrying the original melody can be clearly heard. It may not be obvious to the listener that this song is quoting that carol until the refrain is heard in measure 55.

Careful observance of the dynamic contrasts and tempo alterations will assure that the beauty of this work comes to life in your presentation. If the Triangle and Oboe are used, these additional timbres will add a lovely dimension, but don't let anything overshadow the message of the words.

While this work is based upon a familiar carol, it is also a worship song sung to honor the Child of Christmas. The magi traveled many miles to adore Jesus and shower Him with rare and valuable gifts, setting a tone of praise and adoration. Although sung in a minor key, keep the mood majestic and worshipful. During the refrain, remember we are not singing to be star, only following it – the star merely leads us to the Perfect Light Jesus.
