Sing Praise to God Who Reigns Above is appropriate for Trinity Sunday, Christ the King Sunday, and general services, especially those focusing upon stewardship. Suggested corresponding lectionary readings include Isaiah 12: 5-6 and 49: 13. One basic homilitical theme is giving praise to the Sovereign of Humankind.

In rehearsal, strive for a majestic, dance-like feeling with a pulse of two beats per measure, a fluid, legato line, and crisp diction.

George F. Handel was a renowned international composer of instrumental and vocal works at the end of the Baroque era. Born in Germany, he composed works in that country as yell as in Italy and England. His large-scale English oratorios included many exuberant choruses for the people which made him especially popular in England. Hander's Sing Praise to God Who Reigns Above is a very joyous chorus from his oratorio Saul, which he composed in London in 1738.

The source for this edition is *George Friedrich Handels Werke*, Volume 13, published by Brietkopf and Härtel (1862). The original has been transposed down one step. Scored originally for SATB voices with an accompaniment of oboes, strings and continuo, **Sing Praise to God Who Reigns Above** in this edition includes a key board reduction of the instrumental parts as the accompaniment. Modern clefs, and tempo and dynamic indications have also been added to this publication. Additionally, the editor has added a four measure introduction and a new text to Handel's original version.
